



#### **Homepage**

**Quick Links** is much the same, offering easy navigation to important parts of the website including our Event Calendar, Museum Passes, and other services.

• NEW: Reserve a Study Room or Meeting Room - information about all reservable rooms and the Room Reservation Portal.

"Quick Links" is also found at the bottom of the Homepage, along with Library information including location and hours of operation.


News & Announcements now has it's own area for important Library information.

### Tech Talk

#### **New Libby Hold Suspension Updates!**

Managing your holds in Libby just got simpler! Libby has updated how hold suspensions work to give you more flexibility and control.

Now, instead of selecting a specific end date when



suspending a hold, you can suspend it indefinitely and unsuspend it manually whenever you're ready. If a hold becomes available and you're not ready for it, it will stay suspended until you choose to unsuspend it. No more automatic 7-day countdown.

#### A few other helpful changes:

- Holds that remain suspended for 365 consecutive days will now be automatically canceled.
- The feature previously called "Deliver Later" is now simply called "Suspend", same functionality, just a clearer name.
- If you're a current Libby user with active holds, you'll see a notification in the Holds screen explaining the update.

These changes are now live in both the Libby app and on OverDrive library websites. They're designed to make borrowing easier and more flexible, so you can enjoy your reading on your schedule.

The Massachusetts Library 50+ Job Seekers Networking Group meets via Zoom on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of the month, from 9:30am to 11:30am. Informal networking takes place from 9am to 9:30am and 11:30am to noon. If you are aged 50+, unemployed and actively looking, underemployed, seeking a new career direction, re-entering the job market after a long employment gap, or recently retired and looking for your "Encore Career," this networking group program is perfect for you! Remember, 85% of jobs are found through networking!

Join us in a professional forum for networking with peers in a safe and comfortable environment conducive to developing new relationships and developing skills and strategies to help in your career transition. Each meeting features a new topic. Meetings include a presentation and interactive workshop on topics relevant to career transition, guest speakers, access to hiring managers, small group breakout rooms to network, and 1-on-1 coaching guidance. Participating on a regular basis will give job seekers the many tools and strategies needed for a successful job search.

Each biweekly meeting is facilitated by Deborah Hope, MBA, PCIC, an experienced executive career coach. Deborah is a former Fortune 500 executive, investment banker and entrepreneur. October 27 at 7:00 PM via Zoom



# Embroidered Coats Of Arms In An Age of Revolution with Historic New England

Wednesday, October 29 at 7:00 PM via Zoom



Surveying the history of embroidered coats of arms created in Boston in the late eighteenth century reveals a rich tapestry where art, identity, and endurance converge. These detailed needlework creations, often stitched by young women in finishing schools or under expert instruction, were far more than exercises in genteel education they were expressions of family pride, lineage, and cultural heritage. Amidst the turbulence of the American Revolution, these works stood as quiet acts of resilience, preserving personal and familial identity during a time of profound change. As

families faced displacement, redefinition, or reinvention, the practice of heraldic embroidery offered a stabilizing connection to the past.

This talk, led by Dr. Erica Lome, Curator of Collections at Historic New England, explores the compelling stories behind these works, stories of women's education, family tradition, and the lasting power of needle and thread in shaping early American life.

# Death in Colonial Times: Wealthy or Poor by Arielle Nathanson

Walking through any cemetery in New England will reveal stones of all shapes, sizes and materials. The inscriptions and symbolism all vary widely. Even among the oldest of the stones, there is quite a lot to look at and puzzle over.

Take Rock Ridge Cemetery, here in Sharon for example; it features the final

resting places to some of the town's oldest and most notable citizens. Their headstones show all the usual motifs for Colonial times, including the willow, urn, seraphim and death's head. The willow represents the immortality of the soul in heaven. The urn is a symbol for death itself, as cremated remains are often stored in such containers. The seraphim is an angel of the highest order, symbolizing heaven. The death's head is a skull and crossbones with wings, acting as a reminder that death and decay are unavoidable realities for all.
