

The Massachusetts Library 50+ Job Seekers Networking Group meets via Zoom on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of the month, from 9:30am to 11:30am. Informal networking takes place from 9am to 9:30am and 11:30am to noon. If you are aged 50+, unemployed and actively looking, underemployed, seeking a new career direction, reentering the job market after a long employment gap, or recently retired and looking for your "Encore Career," this networking group program is perfect for you! Remember, 85% of jobs are found through networking!

Join us in a professional forum for networking with peers in a safe and comfortable environment conducive to developing new relationships and developing skills and strategies to help in your career transition. Each meeting features a new topic. Meetings include a presentation and interactive workshop on topics relevant to career transition, guest speakers, access to hiring managers, small group breakout rooms to network, and 1-on-1 coaching guidance. Participating on a regular basis will give job seekers the many tools and strategies needed for a successful job search.

Each biweekly meeting is facilitated by Deborah Hope, MBA, PCIC, an experienced executive career coach. Deborah is a former Fortune 500 executive, investment banker and entrepreneur. Quabbin: A History and Explorer's Guide with Local Author Michael Tougias

New York Times bestselling author, Michael Tougias, will present a narrated slide presentation about Quabbin Reservoir. The program features the demise of the

"lost towns" flooded to create the Quabbin, the construction of the massive reservoir, and how it works today. In addition, Tougias will take the audience on a natural history tour of the reservoir and surrounding area, with suggestions for day trips.

Over the past 30 years, Michael Tougias has been hiking and researching the Quabbin, interviewing former residents of its flooded towns. Their stories are featured in his book *Quabbin: A History and Explorer's Guide*.



Who REALLY Wrote Shakespeare? with Author and Historian David Kruh

Who REALLY Wrote Shakespeare? The doubts have been around for over 300 years. How could William Shakespeare - a man who never sailed - have written with such accuracy about sailing in "The Tempest"? Or how - without studying law - could he have written with such insight about lawyers, courts and legal issues, in plays such as "Henry IV"? Or how - without ever serving in the military - written so splendidly of the rigors and technical aspects of war as he did in "Hamlet"? That he couldn't and didn't is a fascinating concept that has amused many, tantalized others, and consumed the lives of a few, including a Boston man who, in 1916, went to court to prove that someone other than Shakespeare wrote all those great works. Before you laugh... he won the case. Hear the story of one man's search for the "real" author of the works attributed to William Shakespeare and how - in a stunning piece of historical irony - that search played a role in the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor!

Tory Treasure in the Cranberry Bog by Arielle Nathanson

In 1776, the Pembertons, a wealthy Roxbury family, found themselves in dire straits. The Continental Army was coming to raid the homes of all Tory sympathizers. Mrs. Pemberton, her son Byron and their servant Job Prouty, had to quickly protect their homestead and personal belongings, before sailing away to safety.

Byron's status as a Patriot was enough to save their home. A colonel of the Continental Army took up residence there as a favor to him.

The remaining problem was all the silver plates and gold jewelry belonging to Mrs. Pemberton. Surely, the raiders would still steal such items, even if the Colonel was able to protect their house. Taking the expensive trinkets with them was out of the question, due to their weight and space restrictions on the ships.
